Dispose of Autumn Leaves Properly — As autumn approaches and the leaves start to fall, please remember that the quick, simple, easy way to dispose of fallen leaves is to place them in biodegradable paper bags, marked “Yard Waste” or put them, unbagged, in a can that is separate from the household trash. Place the bags or cans on the opposite side of the driveway from regular trash containers. The leaves will be collected on the same day as the other trash, although not necessarily by the same truck. Please do not rake, sweep or blow leaves into the streets. Leaves in the street end up in our storm sewers, clogging the lines and causing backups and flooding when it rains. Burning leaves is also a violation of city ordinances.

The City of Harrisonville will hold its 2018 Fall Brush Drop Off on Friday, October 26 and Saturday, October 27 Rain or Shine. This drop off will be from 8 until 5 p.m. both days with gates closing promptly at 5 p.m. To access the drop off site, please follow the directional signs from the pool in the City Park at Bradley and Ash Street. Crews will be available to help unload trailers. City personnel ask that all limbs be less than 10" diameter. No yard waste, please. The drop off is for those who live within the city limits. Contractors will not be permitted to use the service. Residents should be prepared to show proof of residency, such as a utility bill, to take advantage of the drop off.

October..... Before 5 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 25
November **Before 8 a.m.**, Monday, Nov. 26
These are the final deadlines for payments of past due accounts. After the deadline, any past due account will be charged an administrative fee of \$50, additional deposit fees as may apply, and scheduled for disconnection on the next business day. Please note: The Board of Aldermen is considering revising the deadlines for payment of past due accounts when the payment deadline falls on a weekend or holiday. the temperature changes on a daily basis and can really cool off at night. It's always a good idea to have your furnace inspected by an HVAC professional to make sure your equipment is operating properly. Carbon monoxide is a deadly odorless gas that can occur when systems are not operating properly. You might also want to consider installing a carbon monoxide detector or, if you have one already, consider replacing it if it is 5 years old or more. Also, check the batteries in your smoke detectors to make sure they are working properly or replace the units if they are over 10 years old.
